

Heat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6 Mask 3 large black peeled bananas with a fork, ther mix well with 75g vegetable or sunflower oil and 100g brown sugar.Add 225g plain flour, & heaped tsp baking powder and 3 tsp cinnamon or mixed spice, and combine well. Add 50g dried fruit or nuts, if using.Bake in an oiled, lined 2lb loaf tin for 20 minutes. Check and cover with foil if the call is prowning.Bake for another 20 minutes, or until a skewer comes out clean. Allow to cool a little before slicing. It's delicious freshly baked, but develops a lovely gooey quality the day after.



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



Fats and oils

Do Now There are many different fats and oils available to the consumer. The general rule is that fats, for example <mark>butter</mark> , are at a solid room <mark>temperature.</mark> Oils, for example, <mark>olive oil</mark> are <mark>liquid</mark> at room temperature. A small number of fats from <mark>plant</mark> sources are naturally semi – solid at room temperature. Fats are solid and come mostly from <mark>animal</mark> sources, whereas oils are mainly <mark>liquid</mark> and come from plant

Butter:

- Butter is made from churning cream and it is high in saturated fat and cholesterol
- Clarified butter is produced by melting regular butter over a low heat and skimming off the milk solids that would be let on top.
- > Butter is one of the most popular cooking fats as it provides a rich flavour. However, it has a low
- smoking point which means it will burn easily if used for sauteing or frying. > Butter is also used as a topping for breads and can be melted into cooked vegetables to enhance
- It can also be added to a number of sauces to provide richness. \succ Butter is a main ingredient in baked goods, such as bread, rolls, cakes and pastries.
- Butter is perishable so it must be stored in the refrigerator
- \succ It should be tightly wrapped because it will absorb strong odours and flavours very easily.

Olive oil:

Olive oil has been a staple of the Mediterranean diet for thousands of years and is growing in popularity in other parts of the world. Its versatility as a cooking oil makes it popular and it has the ability to enhance the flavour of many foods. It is used as a condiment, in the same way we use salt and vinegar, and has proven health benefits.

Sunflower oil is extracted from sunflower seeds. It has a light yellow colour and a mild flavour. It is used as a base for salad dressings and can be combined with other ingredients to alter its flavour. It is used for cooking because like most other refined oils, it has a high smoke point. It is low in saturated fat and cholesterol.

Other types of fat include:

Ghee – Clarified butter used in Indian cuisine.

Suet – a solid white fat found around the kidneys of cows and sheep.

Vegetable oil – a refined oil that has very little taste or smell, used in frying and baking.

Rapeseed oil – cheap to produce and an excellent ingredient for salad dressings as it contains a high level of omega 3 fatty acids.

Lockdown Lesson 4 – Bread for Beginners Bread is a staple food in the UK.

When baking bread, the dough goes through a number of reactions to heat, during the making and baking process.

<u>Coagulation</u> occurs when heat causes the protein within the flour to set.

<u>Dextrinisation</u> occurs when the starch is mixed with water to form a suspension, and with <u>Heat</u>, the starch granules absorb moisture and swell up.

<u>Gelatinisation</u> occurs when the starches are exposed to dry heat, causing the colour to change to a golden brown.

What do each of the ingredients actually do?

Flour:

- Provides bulk or body to the bread as the main ingredient,
- Alters the taste depending on the type of flour used,
- Absorbs water to make dough.
- Contains a strong protein content to stop the dough collapsing.
- Provides starchy carbohydrate and is fortified with vitamins and minerals.

Butter is also used as a topping for bread and rolls it can be melted into cooking vegetables to enhance flavour it can also be added to several sauces to supply richness. Butter is the main ingredient in baked goods such as bread rolls pastries and cakes. Butter is perishable so it must be stored in the refrigerator it must be tightly wrapped because it will absorb strong odours and flavours.

Lard comes from pig's fat that has been made and clarified to produce a firm and evenly textured product with little flavour. lard that is unprocessed has a soft greasy texture and a strong flavour it is softer than butter and has a white colour. It has become less popular over the years as it gives your health problems and obesity

Olive oil

Olive oil has been a staple of the Mediterranean diet for thousands of years and is growing in popularity in other parts of the world its

veracity as a cooking oil makes it popular and has the ability to enhance the flavour of many foods it is also used as a condiment in the same way we use salt and vinegar and has proven health benefits.

Sunflower oil

Sunflower oil is subtracted from sunflower seeds it has a light-yellow colour and has mild flavour it is used as a base for salad dressings and can be combined with other ingredients to alter its flavourings.

BREAD FOR BEGINNERS

Water:

- Liquids help to create the right conditions for the yeast to grow. Liquids hydrate the flour, helping the gluten formation
- Liquids need to be warmed to the right temperature (37) degrees C) to encourage the yeast to grow
- When the dough is baked, water turns to steam to assist with the rise
- Liquids provide the dough with a structure as it is used to bind all the dry ingredients together.

Yeast:

- This is the main raising agent a living organism; when it has the right conditions for growth, it respires and produces carbon dioxide
- The ideal conditions for growth are:
- Warmth- Ideally 37°C
- Moisture- added to dry ingredients
- Food mixed with sugar to feed the yeast
- Tme for the yeast to ferment

Sugar:

- Taste a small amount of salt improves the flavour of

Many people swear by 'affirmations, to help counteract a negative inner monologue and train their brain to think more positively.

The unconscious brain learns through repetition, so the idea is that after a while the phrases will be absorbed into our unconscious belief systems, at which point they will have sunk 'in' and will counteract any destructive and selflimiting beliefs.

We had some great feedback from the tutors and below are some of the highlights.





§ 4 means the students have completed no work at all. These students are of great concern as on their return, they will find catching up on the work very difficult.




I will be holding a live assembly on Monday to announce the winner of this week's reward.




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
